Phonics:

- One syllable type is a **closed syllable**. **Closed syllables** have a **vowel**, followed by a **consonant**. Often closed syllable words have a **CVC pattern consonant**, **vowel**, **consonant**. When we see this pattern in words, the vowel has a **short sound**. In short /a/ words, the sound of a is like the sound in *apple*.
- Read the list of short /a/ words.
- Cut out the letter cards. Read one of the short /a/ words, turn the paper over, then use the letter cards to make the word. Read the word that you made slowly. Listen to the sounds you hear. Flip the paper over to check your letter cards. Repeat this activity for 10 of the words on the list.


